Major John Reyna Tapia, PhD. JD



Major Juan Reyna "John" Tapia (US Army retired), JD, PhD, 90, died Tuesday, August 28, 2012, of cardiac arrest following surgery at Banner Good Samaritan Medical Center in Phoenix.

He was born January 29, 1922, in Ajo to Genero & Guillerma Tapia and grew up in the old Mexican Town neighborhood.

As a youth, he witnessed the crash near Ajo of Captain Emilio Carranza, the "Mexican Lindburgh", three months before the pilot perished in a crash in a storm during a non-stop return flight to Mexico City from New York City in 1928. He participated in many memorial services for Capt. Carranza over the years and wrote several articles about him.

His niece Emily Vansant remembered growing up in Ajo with her favorite uncle. "There was a big hole near the old house, and when it rained the whole neighborhood would come over and we'd go swimming in it," she said. "One time after it rained, John got in a big galvanized tub with a paddle and he sank to the bottom. He must have been in high school. I was really little back then, and he made me laugh."

After graduation from Ajo High School in 1942, he was hired to work at the Ajo Army Air Base as a diesel operating engineer. He worked nights and was responsible for water purification.

He married his childhood sweetheart, Bertha Alicia Velasco Cervantes.

The couple lived in 45 homes in 30 countries during his 22-year career in the US Army. He served as an infantry rifleman in the European Theater during World War II. He fought at D-Day and the Battle of the Bulge before going on to serve in Korea as the platoon leader of the 70th Tank Battalion Company. Dr. Tapia was awarded three Bronze Stars, seven Purple Hearts, and more than 20 medals and five neck medals. A sergeant during the Korean Conflict retired with the rank of major. He earned a bachelor's degree from West Virginia State College, a Juris Doctor from the Blackstone School of Law, and master's and doctoral degrees from the University of Utah. He had a long academic career, teaching at Western Michigan University. Southern Illinois University, Ft. Lewis College in Durango, Colorado, and at Yavapai College in Prescott. Dr. Tapia, well known as a lecturer, published several books of poetry and Hispanic folklore in English and Spanish and served as poetry editor for The Durango Herald of Durango, Colorado.

He was awarded the Order of Don Quixote by Sigma Delta Pi, the National Collegiate Hispanic Honor Society.

He was active in the Republican Party in leadership positions.

He was inducted into the Arizona Veterans Hall of Fame Class of 2005. The Prescott Military Order of the Purple Heart 608 Meritorious voted to name the chapter in his honor, and he was an active charter member of the American Legion, Disabled American Veterans and Veterans of Foreign Wars as well as volunteering at the Bob Stump Veterans Administration Medical Center in Prescott.

In November 2007, the Prescott City Council honored Dr. Tapia with the Veteran John R. Tapia Hall of Fame Medal Recipient Appreciation Day.

Dr. Tapia is survived by his wife of 70 years, Bertha Alicia Velasco Cervantes Tapia, of Prescott; and by many other family members.

A memorial service with military honors was held September 8 at the Veterans Administration Medical Center Chapel in Prescott. Burial will be in Arlington National Cemetery.

She was born May 31, 1940 in San Fernando, California, to Matiana and Mateo Silva.

Mrs. Moreno lived in Ajo from 1972 to 1983 and still has family here.


He was a lifetime member of VFW Post 3578 and insisted on visiting the post every time he came to Ajo.
